Go online and check out your local library to see what's available. In the meantime if you need a recommendation for a book this week then check out "American Dirt" by Jeanine Cummins. It's a story about a mother and her son and their journey through Mexico to America as they are forced to flee their home in the aftermath of violence. It is a gripping and emotional tale, at times tense and at times heart breaking. It also shines a light on the injustices faced by migrants and the real victims of organised crime.






